

Upcoming DVD.... Tuesday, July 23rd 9:15 a.m. in classroom 3 "Saint Charbel"



Joseph Makhlouf was born in 1828 in Lebanon. His peasant family lived a strong faith, were attentive to the Divine Liturgy, and had a great devotion to the Mother of God.

At the age of 21, Charbel left his loving and closely knit family to enter the Lebanese-Maronite Monastery called Notre-Dame de Mayfouk. Following studies and perpetual profession at St. Cyprian de Kfifane Monastery, he was ordained in 1859.

For the next 7 years, Charbel lived in the mountainous community of d'Anaya. After that he spent the next twenty-three years in complete solitude at Sts. Peter and Paul Hermitage near d"Anaya. He died there on Christmas Eve, 1898.

Charbel had a reputation for his austerity, penances, obedience, and chastity. At times, Charbel was gifted with levitations during prayer, and he had great devotion to the Most Blessed Sacrament.

In all thins, Charbel maintained perfect serenity. He was beatified in 1965 by Pope Paul VI and canonized by Pope John Paul II in 1977.

The Fourth of July—also known as Independence Day or July 4th—has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution.

When the initial battles in the Revolutionary War broke out in April 1775, few colonists desired complete independence from Great Britain, and those who did were considered radical.

By the middle of the following year, however, many more colonists had come to favor independence, thanks to growing hostility against Britain and the spread of revolutionary sentiments such as those expressed in the bestselling pamphlet "Common Sense," published by Thomas Paine in early 1776.

On June 7, when the Continental Congress met at the Pennsylvania State House (later Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate Richard Henry Lee introduced a motion calling for the colonies' independence.

On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of Lee's resolution for independence in a near-unanimous vote (the New York delegation abstained, but later voted affirmatively). On that day, John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail that July 2 "will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival" and that the celebration should include "Pomp and Parade...Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other."

On July 4th, the Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, which had been written largely by Jefferson. Though the vote for actual independence took place on July 2nd, from then on the 4th became the day that was celebrated as the birth of American independence.

Did you know? John Adams believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American independence, and would reportedly turn down invitations to appear at July 4th events in protest. Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died on July 4, 1826—the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence.

The tradition of patriotic celebration became even more widespread after the War of 1812, in which the United States again faced Great Britain. In 1870, the U.S. Congress made July 4th a federal holiday.

Over the years, the political importance of the holiday would decline, but Independence Day remained an important national holiday and a symbol of patriotism.

Saint Maria Goretti Feast Day: July 6 Patron of Catholic Youth, Girls

Some Facts about her.....

- * She chose death over sin
- * Until recently, she was the youngest saint canonized by the Church
 - * She was stabbed 14 times.



Maria Goretti was born on October 16th, 1890, to a poor Italian farm family. Her father died a few years later. One day, twelve-year-old Maria was sewing a shirt when Alessandro Serenelli, a young farmworker, attacked and tried to rape her. Maria cried out, "No! God does not want this! It is a mortal sin. You would go to hell for this!" Enraged, Alessandro stabbed Maria over and over, and left her for dead.

Maria forgave Alessandro before she died. Some years later Maria appeared to Alessandro in prison and gave him white lilies. Alessandro repented of his crime and received God's forgiveness. He asked Maria's mother to forgive him, which she did. They were present together in Rome when Maria was canonized a saint by Pope Pius XII in 1950.

St. Anthony Zaccaria Feast Day—July 5

- 1) His life had holy beginnings. Anthony was born in Italy in 1502. His parents were Lazzaro and Antonia Pescaroli Zaccaria. After his birth, his parents took him to the Cathedral of Cremona, where he was baptized. More than likely, his uncle Don Tommaso Zaccaria, canon of the Cathedral, baptized young Anthony.
- 2) He was a physician called to heal souls and bodies. After studying philosophy at the university of Pavia, Anthony studied medicine at the University of Padua. He graduated in 1524 and practiced as a doctor in his home town for three years. In 1527, he returned to his studies, but this time to discern the priesthood. He was ordained in 1529.
- 3) Anthony was incredibly devoted to the Eucharist. In Vincenza, Anthony introduced lay people to the forty-hour devotion. He encouraged people to join him in praying for forty hours before the exposed Blessed Sacrament. Anthony would preach during the holy hours. Another practice Anthony encouraged was remembrance of the Crucifixion. He would ring the church bells at 3pm every Friday to remind the lay people of Christ's suffering.
- 4) His first Mass included a miracle. Anthony celebrated his first Mass on Christmas at the Oratory of the Monastery of St. Paul of the Angelic Sisters. During the consecration, heavenly light surrounded the new priest. Angels also appeared beside him. Inspired by Saint Paul, Anthony helped start 3 religious orders. The first was the Clerics Regular of Saint Paul, better known as the Barnabites. The second was a group of religious sisters known as the Angelic Sisters of Saint Paul. Finally, he started a lay congregation for lay married people called the Laity of Saint Paul. The group was originally known as the Married of Saint Paul, and it's sometimes referred to as the Oblates of Saint Paul today.
- 5) Anthony was a major player in the counterreformation. He taught as a catechist and reformed the lives of clergy, religious, and lay people.
- 6) He's the patron saint of doctors. While he was traveling on mission, Anthony became ill. He returned to his mother's house where he died, only 10 years after becoming a priest.
- 7) His body is incorrupt. Twenty-seven years after his death, his body was discovered to be incorrupt. You can visit his body at the Church of Saint Barnabas in Milan, Italy.
